The Role of Proteins



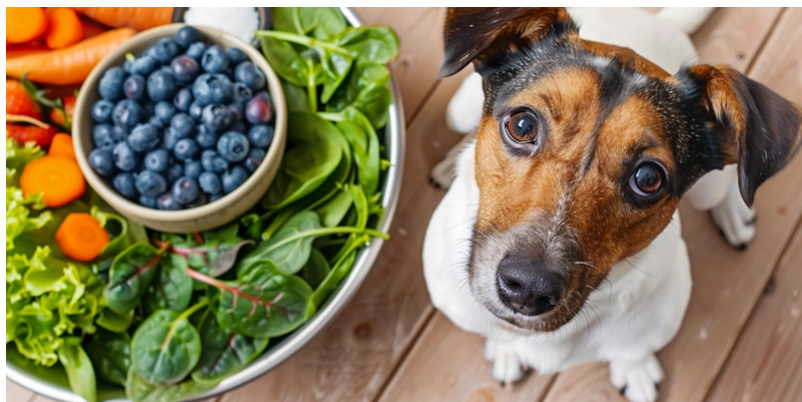
